International impact

Phillipa, was part of 2021-2023). After 10 years working with up to 15 local schools, the project agreements are coming to an end and the work is done. As part of the celebrations, Prior to the formal programme on Wednesday, with school principals and local dignitaries, there will be a Maths Exhibition with participants from all the 15 schools on Monday, and a Literature Festival on Tuesday. These will be large community

events and a wonderful testimony to the accompishments of the project. I am so happy to be here to share in the team's joy and their deep gratitude to God for his faithfulness and sustaining grace.



At the same time, the Sunita Project research team are here, meeting with community groups, Female Community Health Volunteers (FCHVs), school groups, municipality stake-holders and hospital staff to review progress and the impact of the awareness-raising and training to date.
